We marched as Kim Sloan from Harrison said, "so that every girl child can live fully." We marched for the America in which we know it can be.

Our congregation was very well represented there to support all of the people we love and don't even know. Please make the hopes of every person that was there that Saturday come true by speaking up, contacting your politicians, become more active, and standing up for others.

Transition Team II

I wanted to take this opportunity to introduce the Transition Committee II team and bring everyone up to date with the current status of the project to change/enhance our physical space in order to better serve our congregation spiritually, educationally and socially in an environment that will also be welcoming to potential new members.

I am representing the Board and serving as Chair of this ad hoc committee, and I am joined by Valerie McNee, Chad Dillard, Mike Finley, Edith Bradberry, Martha Rimmer, Kerrie Carlock, Dan Danielson and Jerry Blackburn. I would like to thank all of these individuals for agreeing to serve on the committee and to also thank our President, Cas Rifkin, for putting the committee together. Additionally, we all owe a debt of gratitude to the hard work done by the first Transition Committee in rearranging the worship space to provide for our current status. There was a great deal of thought and effort that went into this.

Our Committee is in the process of organizing itself. In the interim I have met with the Board and Executive Committee. I will meet with the Strategic Planning Committee this week.

At this point I should make clear that absolutely no plan has currently been adopted nor will one be adopted before there is extensive communication with the congregation in order to have a consensus on how to proceed. The primary mission of our committee will be to facilitate this discourse within the congregation so any final decision represents the collective desire of the congregation. I anticipate that initially we will hold a forum immediately after a Sunday worship service in February so we can begin discussing some of the possibilities the Board has identified. At that time we will try to answer questions about the options regarding the physical plant, financing, short and long term effect on the congregation and most importantly whether or not there is an congregational agreement to proceed. The whole process will take several months to reach a conclusion and the congregation will be kept fully involved and informed during this time.

You need not wait for a scheduled meeting but should feel free to approach any of the members of the committee at any time.

2017 Buffalo River Camping and Canoe Trip

The UUCLR Memorial Day trip to the Buffalo River is a wonderful time of camping, fellowship, and fun on the river for all - except the beleaguered organizer who is trying to find canoes, match up partners, outfit everyone with a life jacket and paddles, and collect last minute payments. This year, so that everyone, including the organizer, has a fun and safe weekend, **there will be some IMPORTANT changes:**

1. Anyone may camp, right up to the weekend - cost is \$8 for each adult 18 years or older per night. The UUCLR organizer will still collect the fees and pay the U.S. Park Service. Please pay this person in advance, if possible. Juggling money and making change can be tough while in a bathing suit.
2. Cabin reservations are the responsibility of individuals. Some rooms and a cabin are being held - email uuclr@uuclr.org for info.
3. **If you want to go on the river, all canoes/kayaks/shuttle reservations for Saturday and/or Sunday are to be made directly with Dirst Canoe Rentals.** Their phone numbers are 800-537-2850 or 870-449-6636. **UUCLR will no longer be responsible for canoe reservations.**
Warning: Canoes can be scarce on this popular weekend, so please do not wait past May 1 to make your reservation - the sooner the better. Tell Dirst you are part of the UUCLR group so that you will be included for the shuttle busses. You do not have to rent from Dirst, but coordination may be more difficult if you pick a different company.
4. Potluck at the Pavilion is on Saturday, starting at 5:30pm. A grill is available if you wish to bring charcoal. Bring your own plates, cups, utensils, something to drink, and a dish to share. Take away all your dirty dishes, left over food, and trash. It is **pack in/pack out**. We ask \$4/adult to cover pavilion costs. This should be paid ahead of time.

The biggest change is the shifting of all responsibility for canoe rentals to individuals. No float money will be collected by UUCLR.

9. Grow in your own faith. RE at UUCLR is a place where everyone can deepen their sense of being at home with the universe; where they can think about their own experiences and explore what meaning other stories have for them; where they can express joy; and learn skills to carry their values to the wider world.
