REFLECTIONS — REV. PAUL BEEDLE "THE WHITEWASH OF THE DISMAL SCIENCE"

You might know that economics has a nickname: *the dismal* science. At college in the early 1980s, I learned that this was because economics is a science that tells us things that are true that we wish were false. The poster child for this explanation was Thomas Malthus, author of *An Essay on the Principle of Population*, who asserted that population increase drives down wages and produces poverty.

What you might not know is that this account is a whitewash. Malthus, named England's first professor of political economy in 1805 (teaching nearly 30 years at the East India Company College until his death in 1834), *did* write that essay, published anonymously in 1798 and with his name attached in five subsequent editions (1803, 1806, 1807, 1816, and 1826) *and* a condensed edition (1830). But it only indirectly inspired the nickname, coined much later – in 1849 – by Scottish historian Thomas Carlyle.

Carlyle was inveighing against a particular assumption of the dismal science: that people were basically all the same. Many political economists, notably John Stuart Mill (author of *On Liberty*), opposed the institution of slavery: if people are all basically the same, then all equally deserve liberty. Carlyle was among those who supported slavery in England's Caribbean colonies to ensure that their nonwhite labor force remained productive.

In an *ad hominem* attack on Mill and other anti-slavery economists, Carlyle wrote: "Not a 'gay science,'* I should say, like some we have heard of; no, a dreary, desolate, and indeed quite abject and distressing one; what we might call, by way of eminence, the dismal science." (*Occasional Discourse on the Negro Question*).

Well, perhaps the nickname arose because economics told *Carlyle* something he wished were false.

Even so, that we have changed the narrative of its origin as we have presents another example of how racism leads us from truth unto "truthiness." It's important that the stories we tell ourselves are true. The nickname was a defense of racism, not a reaction to Malthus.

Better all of us more alike than unalike; and better all of us more like Mill than Carlyle.

*The 'gay science' that Carlyle had heard of was not that of Nietzsche, published some 33 years later; the term was commonly used in the mid-19th century to refer to the art of the troubadours.

FOOD PANTRY NEWS

Fresh Fruit and Veggies Very Popular at Pantry

For the past six months, the food pantry has benefitted from a grant from Pulaski County that allowed us to purchase meat or other protein and fresh vegetables and fruit. We were awarded \$12,000 in October and a second \$12,000 tranche in February.

The plan is to spend every cent by the final report due on April 29. The money has been greatly appreciated because it let us buy meat when the Arkansas Foodbank had nothing. Meat has been the most popular item in the weekly bags we hand out. A close second is bananas. Often the people will peel and eat one of the bananas immediately.

The grant money is from the American Recovery Act, which Judge Barry Hyde believed would be best used in improving nutrition in elderly and marginalized individuals. Sadly, this source is not going to continue to be available but Judge Hyde wants to find ways to some sort of support as a part of the county budget.

Edwards Food Giant grocery store has been supporting the Pantry by selling us fresh fruit and vegetables at a discount. Every Monday, the produce manager gets a card from us with the weekly food order. Then on Friday, one of the pantry volunteers shows up at 7:30am to collect the boxes of bananas, oranges, onions, and tomatoes.

A capacity building grant of \$500 was awarded by the Arkansas Hunger Relief Alliance. This money was spent on purchase of shopping bags that are thick enough so that they don't tear when loaded with canned goods. This is a great help to the 'walkers,' the community members who have no cars. They come with bicycles, old strollers, and wagons.
